

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
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#### **Some Otter News**


We have an otter family living in Serene lakes! Mom, dad and 1 or 2 pups (depending on who you talk to). The otters are playful, cute, and not dangerous to people or pets. According to Wikipedia:

Where do they live and eat? The North American river otter is found throughout most of the US, including the Sierra Nevada. Otters are at home in both the water and on land. They live in dens or burrows close to the water's edge. The den typically has many tunnel openings which allow the otter to enter and exit the water. Otters are carnivores that eat fish, crayfish, snakes, birds, and frogs.

**Family life.** In the Sierras, river otters usually have their young in March or April. Litters average one to three young, called pups. The mothers raise their young without help from the father. When the pups are about two months old and their coats grow in, their mother introduces them to the water. By fall the pups are able to take care of themselves, but usually stay with their families, sometimes including the father, until the spring.

**How can we protect the otters?** Otters are near-sighted and may approach within a few feet of a boat or a person. They aren't dangerous to humans or pets, but humans and dogs can be dangerous to otters.

River otters, like all wildlife, require space. Don't approach otters you see in the water or on shore. Use binoculars to get close views. If the otter approaches you, stand still and silent. Let them go about their business; they are not a threat. **Remember: Never feed river otters or other wild animals.** 



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

She loved walking through the campsites to see the creative ways teams brought their personality to the race. Sugar Bowl would like to host the event next year, but the details for next year's race won't be decided for a few months.

## Ragnar 2018 Agony of Da Feet

Ragnar Tahoe returned to Royal Gorge for their fourth year this past July. My wife Sharon and I have participated in two previous Ragnar events on the Summit. We would have entered last year but unfortunately we were out of the area. Our team, "Agony of Da Feet", was made up of six family members and two friends ranging in ages 13 to 59.

Never heard of a Ragnar? The concept is simple. Get eight of your running buddies, come up with a team name, make some T-shirts with your team name and bring all your camping gear for two days of running and hiking in the heat of the day and wonderfully cool nights on the Summit. Luckily for us our cabin is only a block away from Summit Station and the Ragnar Village. After each of our runs we were able to come back to shower and nap in the comforts of the cabin. Apparently renting cabins is the way to go considering every rental cabin in our neighborhood was occupied by a Ragnar team.

The relay went like this... 8 runners on a team were required to run three different loops of varying length. The green loop was 3.2 miles, yellow loop 7.1 miles and red loop 6.4 miles. The first runner ran the green loop, second runner ran the yellow loop, third runner ran

the red loop, fourth runner ran the green loop and so on. Once the eighth runner finished, runner number one started again and ran the yellow loop, runner number two ran the red loop. Again, once the eighth runner finished the first runner started again on his/hers last loop which was the red loop. Once the eighth runner completed their last loop the race was completed for the team. Our team was given a 7:30 am start time on Friday; we finished Saturday afternoon at 3:30 before the 4 PM cutoff time..

Most of our team members are confident trail runners but almost all of us had some concerns with the night portion of the relay. Getting lost, wild animals, falling down, getting lost, lights not working and did I mention getting lost. But to our delight the night runs were the most fun leg of the relay for all of us. The temperatures during the weekend were in the mid 8os during the day but on the ridges the temperature felt more like it was in the 100s. The trail was marked so well with reflective directional signs and tiny LED lights that the trail was easier to follow at night than during the day. The night time




temperature was in the 50s. The waxing gibbous moon set around 2:00 am to give way to the stars of the Milky Way. Each leg of the run showcased our beautiful area by using a mix of Royal Gorge ski trails and Land Trust single track trails.


Sharon and I participate in numerous running races, bike races and triathlons each year. The promoter that organizes Ragnar Relays is exceptional. Leading up to the event they sent out numerous messages on what to expect at Royal Gorge during this event. They announced that there would be no parking at the venue or on any streets in the Serene Lakes neighborhood. Vehicles were queued in the dirt parking lot at Soda Springs Ski Resort and only sent up to Summit Station to drop off gear after a car returned back to park. At night there was a gas fire pit in the Ragnar Village for roasting marshmallows. Movies were projected onto a big outdoor screen while runners waited for their turn to hit the trails. During the day they offered yoga sessions and massages for tired muscles. Ragnar also strongly emphasizes low impact, leave no trace camping, recycling and separating all trash. If you wanted water, coffee or hot chocolate you needed to provide your own container. No paper cups.

The whole event was a blast for Sharon and me. Good times with family and friends and we made some new friends. We met a lot of folks on the trail from all parts of California and the US. 
#### JENYTH GEARHART-UTCHEN



## **SLPOA 2018 ELECTION FOR BOARD OF DIRECTORS**

Voting Requirements for the Annual Meeting and Election of the Board of Directors.

- 1. Quorum Requirements. For a quorum to be present at the annual meeting, 10% of the voting power of the organization must be present either in person or via absentee ballot. At the present time we have 613 members which means quorum is established by 62 votes. This could increase by the time of the annual meeting if more people join SLPOA (see Section 5 f (5) of the Bylaws).
- 2. Election of the Board of Directors. Members may be elected to the Board by one of three methods. A committee of the Board chooses a slate for the open positions which is ratified by the Board. This has been done for this election. The nominees are Jenyth Gearhart-Utchen, Tim Kustic, Joni Rubin, Diane Scanlon, and Jonathan Sorger. A second method of being placed in nominated is via a petition. The petition must be signed by 10 members of the organization and must be presented at least 20 days before the annual meeting. This year the annual meeting takes place on September 2, 2018, so the petition must be received by August 14, 2018. If any group of members wants to nominate candidate(s) for the Board of Directors by petition, the petition should be mailed to the administrative assistant, Linda Cashion, at PO Box 669, Soda Springs, CA 95728. A third way of nominating someone for election to the Board is by a nomination from the floor during the annual meeting. A nominating person and a second is necessary to place that persons' name into contention for election to the Board of Directors (see Section 5 h (1)(2) and (3)).

Any member who name has been placed in nomination can speak at the annual meeting to recite their qualifications for the position; however, only those persons on the slate selected by the Board have their qualifications printed in the newsletter unless a petition candidate's papers are received before the newsletter printing deadline, in which case that person's qualifications are printed in the newsletter. Petition candidates and candidates nominated from the floor may circulate written biographies at the annual meeting.
